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5 PROCEEDINGS 1 2 3 At this time, I'm going to CHAIR: 4 call the March 9th, 2023 Underground Storage Tank Indemnification Board meeting to order. And Rick, 5 6 you're up first. 7 MR. BURGAN: Yeah, I just wanted to 8 review some Board member updates and term renewals. And my first couple of questions is going to be 9 10 addressed to Bill. You were up on March 2nd. Have 11 you heard anything from the Governor's office? 12 MR. BUCKFELDER: No. 13 MR. BURGAN: All right. 14 What about you, Andy? 15 No, I didn't. MR. GREINER: 16 MR. BURGAN: Okay. 17 I had written to them twice already, 18 and they're telling me that it's on their radar. Ι was trying to be proactive, and get you guys appointed 19 20 before your terms expire. And they have told me that 21 they do not start anything until the terms, until 22 after the term expires. So that's - that's the reason 23 for the inquiries here. I will reach out to them 24 again to get you folks reappointed. 25 Next on the list would be Stephanie.

Your term expires April 30th, next month. To get you 1 2 reappointed in that position, I'll need something from 3 you indicating you're willing to continue to serve. 4 And I'll kick it over there. So we can start that. 5 MS. WISSMAN: Okay. 6 MR. BURGAN: Those were the three 7 renewals I had for 2023. There's two, there's a couple next year, Greg Perry and Alex Baloga. 8 We'll go through with those when the time comes since they 9 10 don't seem to want to work ahead on the process. 11 The only other well, I'm going to call 12 a wrinkle is the appointments from the legislature. 13 Chris Hartman had been appointed previously by the 14 Speaker of the House. That position changed. Bryan 15 Cutler, I think, self-appointed himself in November, issued a letter on behalf of Chris reappointing him to 16 the Board. But since then, we've had Mark Rozzi take 17 18 the position. And now as of February 28th, Joanna 19 McClinton which has switched over to the Democratic 20 side. 21 This always happens when we come in on 22 a new administration. I have form letters that are 23 ready to go, but we're kind of waiting until the dust 24 settles across the street, so to speak. I will 25 reissue those letters by - by close of the month

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asking for their representative appointments. 1 So 2 Chris may come back on, I'm not sure. That would 3 depend solely on Speaker McClinton's choosing. 4 I did receive an interesting phone call last week from a representative from Senator Kim 5 6 Ward's office. And I understand she is now Senate 7 President Pro Tempore. Kudos to that gentleman for being proactive. He wanted to know what - what the 8 status of their Board seat was. I told him it's been 9 10 vacant ever since they passed the Act back in 2017. He said they are actively filling positions, and I 11 told him I would, you know. That office will be 12 13 receiving the letter shortly, you know, requesting 14 their appointment. So we will go through that process 15 here. But right now, Chris Hartman is technically off 16 the Board because the individual that appointed him is 17 no longer Speaker of the House, so. 18 I think that was all on my list there. So, once again, I'll circle back to the office on Bill 19 20 and Andy Greiner, and see if we can kick that, kick start that. And then after Stephanie's term expired, 21 22 we'll do the same thing. 23 Anybody have any any questions on that 2.4 I know it gets kind of confusing. at all? 25 MR. GREINER: Hey Rick.

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8 1 MR. BURGAN: Yeah. 2 MR. GREINER: This is Andy - Andy 3 Greiner. 4 MR. BURGAN: Yeah. Just to, maybe it's a 5 MR. GREINER: 6 technical question. Since my term technically 7 expired, can I even vote on the items of action today? I believe you can. 8 MR. BURGAN: And 9 you know, Press and I have had this discussion before. 10 The way the original - the way our bylaws or the way 11 the appointments were written you can -. 12 ATTORNEY BUCKMAN: Andy, this is 13 So the way the appointments work is you are Press. 14 appointed until you are affirmatively, either 15 disengaged from the position or someone else is appointed. So you basically just, you continue as is 16 17 even though your time's expired. 18 MR. GREINER: Okay, thank you. 19 Yeah, it's basically MR. BURGAN: 20 until you resign or until your successor's 21 appointment, right? 22 ATTORNEY BUCKMAN: Yeah. 23 MR. BURGAN: I think that's the way it 24 So you guys are all good. We do have a reads. 25 quorum, we can continue. We just need to get some

technicalities, and you know, getting the Commission 1 2 back on, so. All right, moving on. If I may, Steve, 3 move on to Board elections? 4 CHAIR: Absolutely. 5 MR. BURGAN: Okay. 6 I think everybody's been through this 7 process before, but in March, we do annual elections for Board Chairperson and Board Vice Chairperson. 8 Currently, Steve Hieber is Board Chair, Stephanie 9 10 Catarino Wissman is the Vice Chair. And they were elected, I think, two years ago and reelected last 11 12 year. And so we'll go through the process again this 13 year. 14 It is a nomination process done by a 15 vote and approval. All primary Board members are eligible. There's a couple of exceptions being 16 17 myself, Press Buckman, and the two ex officio which 18 would be the DEP and the Insurance Department. So all 19 the primary members are eligible for election. 20 The chair nomination is first. And so now, I'll open the floor for nominations for Board 21 2.2 Chair. 23 MS. SLAYMAKER: This is Laura 24 Slaymaker. I nominate Steve Hieber. I hope you're 25 willing to serve, Steve.

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10 1 CHAIR: Yes, I am. 2 MR. BURGAN: Okay. 3 Do we have any other nominations for 4 Board chair? Seeing none, do we have a second on 5 Laura's nomination? 6 MR. BUCKFELDER: I second it. 7 MR. BURGAN: All right. Thank you, Bill. All right, so we've 8 9 got the nomination on the floor from Mr. Steve Hieber. 10 All in favor, say aye. 11 (AYES RESPOND) 12 MR. BURGAN: Do we have any nay votes? 13 Okay, sorry about that. Do we have any nays at all? 14 (NO RESPONSE) 15 MR. BURGAN: Okay. 16 Seeing none, Mr. Hieber has been 17 elected by unanimous vote to serve as the Board chair 18 for the next year, which will be from March 2023 until 19 March 2024. 20 I'm moving on to the vice chair position that is currently held by Ms. Stephanie 21 2.2 Wissman. Do we have nominations from the floor for a 23 vice chair? 24 I would nominate Stephanie. CHAIR: 25 MR. BURGAN: Okay.

11 So I heard two. I did recognize Steve 1 2 as nominating Stephanie for vice chair. Do we have a 3 second? 4 MR. BALOGA: Alex Baloga seconds. MR. BURGAN: Thank you, Alex. 5 Do we have any other nominations for a vice chair? 6 All 7 right, hearing none, we'll go to the open vote. All in favor, say aye, please. 8 9 (AYES RESPOND) 10 MR. BURGAN: Aye. Do we have any nay 11 votes? 12 (NO RESPONSE) 13 Okay. All right. MR. BURGAN: 14 Please note that the vice chair 15 position for Ms. Stephanie Wissman was a unanimous 16 vote, and I personally thank you both for your service 17 to the Board. All right. 18 Moving, I'll move on to the annual report. Steve, if I may? 19 20 Absolutely. Please do. CHAIR: 21 MR. BURGAN: All right. All right. 22 Each year we go through the annual 23 report process. This is a calendar year report, as 24 opposed to the fiscal year, which is financially run. 25 This was Amy's first run through the report. She

actually got her part finished early. So, this is a 1 2 joint project between ICF. I see one of the 3 architects, and the other to my right, Linda Wilson, 4 who basically does all of the templates, the charts 5 used to provide some of the data. I do the executive 6 summary, we tweak things here and there, and then ICF 7 turns it over to the graphics department, and I think they did a wonderful job with this. 8 9 This is one of the better reports I've 10 seen around the Commonwealth. Not to toot our own 11 horn, but it's very good. It's very informative. We do go through a vote for approval because this becomes 12 13 a public document after this meeting, and it gets 14 posted to our website for everybody to view. So I did 15 circulate this to the Board members last week, I 16 believe, and again yesterday. 17 Does anybody have any questions on the 18 report at all that I could field? Okay, seeing none, 19 I would like to bring it up, bring the report approval 20 to the floor for a vote. Do we have a nomination to 21 approve the 2022 USTIF annual report? MS. SLAYMAKER: This is Laura 22 23 I move approval of the '22 USTIF annual Slaymaker. 24 report. 25 I'll second. CHAIR:

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1 MR. BURGAN: Thank you, Steve. Okay. 2 All in favor of approving this year's 3 report, say aye. (AYES RESPOND) 4 5 MR. BURGAN: Do we have any nay votes? 6 (NO RESPONSE) 7 MR. BURGAN: Excellent. Okay. Please note that the Board has 8 9 approved the 2022 annual USTIF report. 10 Just as an aside to that, you know, in addition to the digital versions that are out - that's 11 12 out there, we do get some hard copies of the report 13 printed. If anybody wishes to have an actual hard 14 copy, let me know and I will get you one in the mail. 15 Let's see, okay. I think I'm about done with my business people for now. 16 17 CHAIR: Okay. 18 Thanks, Rick. Let's move on to the program statistics. And Amy, I'll let you take over. 19 20 MS. FORBES-WITT: Thank you, Steve. Good morning, everyone. I have the values for the 21 22 claim summary data and payment information for the 23 calendar year to date. As of February 28th, 2023, 2.4 we've had 28 new claims received and no reopenings so 25 far. Claims closed that were eligible for payments

14 equal 24, and none were closed without a payment. 1 2 There were four denied claims, so far, 3 and five claims that were withdrawn. We've had 33 4 claims closed in total this year, and the total pending claim count has now decreased to 828. 5 6 The dollars paid thus far relating to 7 claims payments equals \$4,582,576.36. The cost per close claim equates to \$249,426.38 on average. 8 Regarding the tip program, there were 9 10 no new Tip claims received, no claims were closed, and 11 we have three open tip claims. The reserves are set 12 at \$1,150,000. We have not made any tip payments so 13 That concludes the claims and payment far this year. 14 information. And, does anyone have any questions or 15 comments? 16 MR. GREINER: Hi. This is Andy 17 Greiner. One quick question. What's the average life of a claim? 18 19 MS. FORBES-WITT: Off the top of my 20 head -. 21 It's reported today and MR. GREINER: 22 if some will get denied, but one that would be 23 honored, is that a five year life, or is there an 24 average number that you can speak to? 25 MR. BURGAN: Yeah, I'll handle that,

15 1 Andy. 2 MS. FORBES-WITT: Yeah, I can't think. 3 MR. BURGAN: Statistically, since 4 1994, the average life cycle is seven years from start 5 to finish. 6 MR. GREINER: Okay. 7 MR. BURGAN: Now, as Amy said, you know, some of these may only last six months. Believe 8 it or not, we actually have a claim from '94 that's 9 10 still open a couple from '95. So when you push them all together, it's about five to seven years. 11 12 MR. GREINER: Okay. 13 And that leads to my next question 14 then. The reserves that are shown, that are set, does 15 that contemplate the reserves for the life of the claim or just for this policy year or this plan year? 16 17 MR. BURGAN: Those are reserved for the life of the claim. 18 19 MR. GREINER: Okay, thank you. 20 MR. BURGAN: Yeah, and they do get adjusted periodically based on, you know, additional 21 22 site information that comes in. So those do vary. 23 They are not set in stone. ICF, you know, has to look 24 at a file at least every six months, and during that 25 period, while they are looking at that file, they are

also doing a reserve analysis. And so if we need to 1 2 do an increase, they submit it. Amy's staff will 3 approve it. But yeah, it's kind of a fluid thing, but 4 we do reserve for actuarial purposes what we think is the number that's going to get us done, so. 5 6 MR. GREINER: Okay. 7 And the reason I ask is, I know 8 looking at claims reserves for other lines of business, the effects of inflation now are much more 9 10 drastic than they were two years ago. So I'm just 11 wondering if the numbers reflect, obviously we don't know what the rates going to, the inflation rate's 12 13 going to be, but -14 MR. BURGAN: Yeah. 15 MR. GREINER: - it's obviously much 16 higher now than it was two years ago. So hopefully the reserves reflect that. 17 18 MR. BURGAN: Yeah, they actually do. And so they are looked at, and you know, we reserve to 19 20 our best - best knowledge and judgment at times. 21 They're pretty accurate. 22 MR. GREINER: Okay, thank you. 23 MR. BURGAN: Sure. 24 CHAIR: Do we have any other 25 questions? Okay.

1 Hearing none, Amy, thank you very 2 much. And Rick, thank you. Let's move on now to the 3 financial statements. Rick. 4 MR. BURGAN: Okay. If you turn to your packet there, I'm 5 6 going to start on page four, which would be the 7 revenue and expenditure sheet. Once again, I would note that unlike the annual report, Commonwealth 8 report goes by Commonwealth fiscal year, so it's July 9 10 1st to June 30st. These financials were for the first 11 six months of the fiscal year ending December 31st, 12 2022. 13 For the first six months of the year, 14 we booked revenue of \$28,341,816. The subset of that 15 would be the fees that are collected by our revenue units. If you lump the gallon tank capacity and tip 16 together, we put \$28,281,737 in fees during that six 17 18 month period. I looked at last year, we had 19 \$29,425,745. So we're down about \$1.14 million. 20 We just went through the annual billing process here in December and January and 21 22 February, and those are big months. I understand in 23 speaking with Lisa Fry, my revenue manager, we are 24 actually ahead of last year by one or two percent. 25 So, now don't let the \$1.14 million deficits scare

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We're right on track as were last year. 1 you. 2 On the total revenue line, you see the 3 big swing from last year, we had \$37.1 down to \$28.3. 4 This is, once again, this is market driven. You'll see the net increase fair value investment. You know, 5 6 last year we were \$3 million will to the good. This 7 year we're \$5 million to the bad. So there's your \$8 million difference right there. 8 9 Going down to expenditures. We had administrative expenditures, which is my staff, me, 10 11 ICF and some outside services. It's \$2,742,049. Claims expenses for the first six months were 12 \$13,882,285. And you will see there that we released 13 to DEP funds of \$4,541,700. Which brings expenditure 14 15 to \$21,169,943. If you look on the line below that, 16 the good news is that our revenues actually exceeded 17 expenditures by \$7,171,873. The fund balance as of 18 December 31st was \$378,320,807. 19 Lastly, in regards to the financials, 20 it would be page 11. And this would be our actual actuarial liability figures. And you will see that we 21 22 have funds in excess of our actuarial liabilities at 23 the moment, \$79,562,571. All in all, from my opinion, 24 looks pretty good to me. I'd say, we've eliminated 25 that unfunded deficit and which things are trending in

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a positive direction. 1 2 Does anybody have any questions that I can feel regarding the financials? 3 Okay. 4 This is Greq Perry. MR. PERRY: Ι 5 have a question. 6 MR. BURGAN: Yes. 7 MR. PERRY: On page 11, you're looking at the actuarial liability. It's gone down in 2022. 8 I'm curious about that, you know, because I agree with 9 10 Andy that I see inflation increasing costs. Why would 11 our liability be going down? 12 MR. BURGAN: That's a good question, Greq. It's related to, our claims counts are 13 14 diminishing. You will see on Amy's, if you look at 15 Amy's claim summary, you will see that we've been actually dropping the total number of claims each year 16 17 by about 30 or 40. So that has eliminated all those reserves that were needed to close all those files. 18 So basically, once we close claim, the reserves comes 19 20 off the books. Andy's familiar with that. The actuarial liability comes down. So that is a result 21 22 of the decreasing number of claims that we've been 23 handling per year. Does that make sense? 24 Yes, it does. MR. PERRY: I'm a 25 little surprised. I would expect this as, and all of

the claims will - but that's, I don't know. Are they 1 2 getting -? I'm having a real hard 3 MR. BURGAN: 4 time following you, Greq. You got a real choppy feed. 5 MR. PERRY: Okay. 6 Well I - but I guess I would expect 7 the claims would, as - the cost of addressing the 8 claims is coming down that's, I would assume that. 9 Thank you. 10 MR. BURGAN: All right, Greq. 11 Anybody else have any questions 12 though? All right. Back to you, Steve. 13 CHAIR: Okay. 14 Hearing none, I think we'll move on. 15 I have Kris, I assume you're standing in for Troy? 16 MR. SHIFFER: Yeah. Should I go, 17 proceed, Steve? 18 Steve yes, if you would, CHAIR: 19 please. 20 MR. SHIFFER: All right. 21 Well, good morning, everyone. As 22 Steve alluded to, my name is Kris Shiffer. I'm the 23 Program Manager for Pennsylvania's Storage Tank 24 Program, filling in for Troy this morning. 25 So for some statistics on the

Pollution Prevention Grant program, commonly known as 1 2 the pump and pluq. For the current fiscal year that 3 began on July 1st, 2022, two grants have been approved 4 for \$9,750 and no additional applications are pending at this time. Since the program's inception on 5 6 January 31th, 1998, 1,156 grants have been approved 7 totaling over \$5.9 million. Any questions on the pump and plug 8 9 before I would proceed? Okay, hearing none the 10 environmental cleanup and program statistics for the current fiscal year, again beginning on July 1st, 11 2022, DEP has expended \$941,577 of the \$3.4 million 12 13 the Board approved for the environmental cleanup program. DEP is currently working on 16 sites. 14 As 15 part of that expenditure, 57 heating oil reimbursements have been approved, totaling \$234,666, 16 17 with two additional applications pending at this time. 18 Any questions with that? 19 All right. MR. BURGAN: 20 MR. SHIFFER: Thank you, Steve. CHAIR: 21 Thank you, Chris. Okay. 22 Moving on, Rick, we're coming back to 23 you for the performance review. 24 MR. BURGAN: Yeah, I just wanted to, 25 couple of tidbits here at the end. As you are aware,

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you know, by statute, USTIF has to do the five year 1 2 performance review. We had that presented at the 3 December meeting by Aon. It was relatively good 4 That by statute gets submitted to the overall. legislature. And I just want to report that that was 5 6 completed by our Legislative Director Abdoul Barry on February 8th of '23. 7

As of today, I've had no questions 8 9 from any members of the House or Senate regarding 10 that. I remember I did get one five years ago about 11 the cost of it. I answered that, but this year we've had no follow up. So if I do get any questions, I'll 12 13 certainly let you folks know. But I just want to let 14 you know that the last piece of the puzzle, which is 15 the distribution to the leadership over in Senate and the House has been completed with no follow up back to 16 17 me.

18 Moving on, I know we've talked about Each year we are required to submit an 19 this before. 20 extensive document to EPA Region Three, as well as national EPA. Basically, they take our temperature 21 22 every year. A lot of financial information, actuarial 23 information, any legislative, any pending legislation 24 on the books, what are your claim counts, how many 25 tanks do you have out there, what's a subset of tanks

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1	here and there. So it's a comprehensive report.
2	Kudos to Amy. She was only a couple
3	of months in the door and she tackled that thing. And
4	I think we did have that submitted ahead of schedule.
5	EPA has finished their review of that. In fact, we
6	had a conference call with them in January and
7	reviewed it on a conference call with those folks.
8	They have signed off formally on the 2022. And they
9	sent me an email indicating that similar to previous
10	years, EPA found that Pennsylvania's fund to be sound
11	with no concerns, as the fund is well funded.
12	So that will close the books on the
13	2022 EPA Fund soundness survey. The other one will
14	come out September normally, is due by the end of
15	October. So we'll address that when it gets here.
16	Lastly, I've got - god, I'm going to
17	make it through this. We have a USTIF staff update
18	that I'd like to put before the board. I know she's
19	on the call today. Her name is Sandy Frye. Sandy
20	Frye is going to be leading the USTIF program
21	officially on April 14th. Sandy's - as of tomorrow,
22	Sandy will have been with the Commonwealth for 34
23	years. Extremely respectable, commendable, lots of
24	service hours. Sandy actually started with PennDOT.
25	She came to the insurance department

1 in May of 1992. Actually in one of my other funds, 2 the Workers Comp Security Fund. Found her way to 3 USTIF on July 30th, 1997. Now USTIF program itself is 4 29 years old. Sandy has been with the program for 26 5 years. Unbelievable. Sandy actually helped train me 6 when I came through the door 12 years ago.

7 Sandy just, she's an encyclopedia of 8 historical knowledge pertaining to USTIF. You know personally, we are very sad to see her go as, you 9 10 know, you can tell from me breaking up here a little 11 bit. But she will sorely be missed, but she definitely deserves it. I mean, 34 years with the 12 13 Commonwealth, 26 years with the USTIF program. Once 14 again kudos - kudos Sandy, commendable. Thank you. Ι 15 appreciate your service. I just wanted to get this on 16 the record for the Board and let them be aware that we 17 are losing a valuable member of the USTIF team. And, 18 but we will - we will move forward to - TO try and replace Sandy. I know it's a tough, those are though 19 20 shoes to fill, but Sandy, I just want to express my personal thanks for all that you've done for the 21 22 program. And round of applause for Sandy. 23 MS. FRYE: Thank you for that. Ι 24 learned a lot in the last 30 some years from all the

programs, but I did enjoy working on it. I know this

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program makes me know that I never want to own a gas 1 2 station. And if I did, I'd probably know exactly what 3 to do just to make sure everything was done right. 4 Thank you so much. Thank you, Sandy. 5 MR. BURGAN: With 6 that, we've basically run through the slate of 7 business today. I'll just remind the members, the remaining meeting dates for the year will be on June 8 8th, September 24th - September 21st, excuse me, and 9 10 December 14th. And we will stick with those dates, you know, unless I have a couple of members approach 11 me with conflicts. But I haven't seen any to date. 12 13 So that's all I've got today, Steve. Unless anybody 14 else has any questions for the general good? All 15 right, seeing none back to you, Mr. Hieber. 16 CHAIR: All right. 17 At this time, I would accept a motion 18 for adjournment. 19 This is Andy Greiner. MR. GREINER: Ι 20 make a motion we adjourn. 21 MS. WISSMAN: This is Stephanie 22 Wissman, and I second. 23 All those in favor? CHAIR: 2.4 (AYES RESPOND) 25 CHAIR: Any opposed?

(NO RESPONSE) CHAIR: Okay. At this time, we will end the meeting. I thank all and we certainly thank you, Sandy, for your service. * * * * * * * * MEETING CONCLUDED AT 10:36 A.M. * * * * * * * *
